Ed Schleppe, K8VKA, SK

We were all saddened by news of the recent passing of Edwin "Ed" Schleppe, K8VKA. Ed died peacefully at home on July 27, 2009. He was 69 years old. Ed developed an interest in amateur radio as a freshman in high school and became a licensed ham radio operator when he was 20 years old. Ed often worked behind the scenes, coordinating volunteers for agencies such as the State Fire Marshal's Office and equipment for community events. He was recognized for his work as a Reserve Police Officer in the City of Pickerington 2003 Annual Report for "service during special events and parades... essential to the success of the department...."

Ed represented (CORC) on the Volunteer Organization Coordinating Council, a committee of volunteer agency liaisons who collaborate with the Franklin County Emergency Management and Homeland Security staff in support of their mission to coordinate county-wide all-hazards disaster planning, community education, warning, training, grant funding, response, and recovery.

Ed's enthusiasm for radios as a hobby merged with his career in 1988, when he bought Comtech, Inc., a communication and cellular company. New radio antennas and towers at his home and business expanded the coverage area for CORC's many repeaters. Ed received a CORC Life Membership for over 30 years of service back in 2004. All together he served the club over 37 years. He was a founding member and a wonderful asset to the club.

Ed embraced new technology throughout his life, working as the Chief Engineer at 104.9 WCVO Radio (now The River), and as VP of Christian Internet Radio www.wcvi.org, where he was the technician responsible for streaming radio online. Ed's often unseen contributions to the community will be missed, but never forgotten.

Travelin' Tony's Timetables

Greetings to all reading this article! By the time you receive this newsletter we will be heading into Autumn and cooler days and nights. Where did the Summer go!

I'd like to thank everyone who stopped by the CORC table at the Voice of Aladdin Columbus Hamfest. It was nice to see several hams I've met before, as well as a few new hams who had just received their license. Welcome to the hobby! I also met a handful of people who were studying to get their license and were there to see what ham radio was all about. Seeing the new and soon-to-be-new hams at the event gave me the inspiration for this article.

So you just got your ham license. Now what? After all those hours of studying FCC rules, protocol, and basic electronics, all you have to show for it is a piece of paper from the government. What do you *do* with a ham license? Like so many other things in life, it all depends on what you want to make of it.

Ham radio is a very diverse hobby. There are groups and on air nets covering dozens of interests. Do you like public service? How about putting together your own equipment? Whatever it is, ham radio likely has a focus area to match your special interest.

The first place to look for these groups is in your local community. Most people start their ham careers talking on the local repeaters. Supporting the local repeater clubs (such as CORC) help to ensure that the repeaters they maintain will be available for you to talk on, and also be available if a local disaster should take place. Local repeater clubs are a good way to get to know the hams in your community.

Beyond the repeater clubs, public service groups such as COARES provide emergency communications support in times of disaster, and assist in other events such as marathons and parades. Other public service groups include weather spotting (COSWN and Skywarn), and formal traffic handling (COTN). Public service can be very challenging, but also very rewarding and a lot of fun.

Then there are club groups, groups which focus on a particular aspect of ham radio (such as QRP or DX), and groups who get together just to chit chat (some are formal, others are not).

Even if you do not get involved with a formal group or club, there's so much you can do with the hobby. And don't forget to tap into the greatest part of the hobby if you need help – the hams themselves. Having problems building an antenna? Chances are there is someone who can help you with your project. Not sure which radio to buy? Ask 10 hams, they'll give you 10 different opinions, but knowledge is power when making your radio purchase decision.

The bottom line I'm trying to convey is get involved in the hobby. And if you don't join a group, at least get to know the hams you talk to on the radio. There's so much to experience in ham radio, and so much to learn from those in the hobby.

BUCKEYE D-STAR COLUMN

The Summer of 2009

Here it is fall again – Ohio State has played its first game and started the season with a win – GO BUCKS!!

Most hams spent the summer vacationing and relaxing – not as much ham activity; therefore, The Buckeye D-STAR Net was curtailed until fall. EVEN SO there is much to talk about and D-STAR activity has actually increased overall in Ohio with the Cincinnati area having the most activity, Dayton second and Columbus third – let's see if we can get to be #1 on D-STAR!! Even though the new sunspot cycle has gotten off to a very slow start, making propagation on HF a challenge, once again D-STAR comes through by allowing world-wide communications using the D-STAR gateway.

We had a very nice D-STAR get together during the Dayton Hamvention – there were many “famous” D-STAR users and programmers there to meet. There were quite a few D-STAR radios sold especially since **ICOM introduced two new radios** for which the software is now available FREE as a download from the ICOM website. **The handheld is the IC-80AD and the mobile/base is the IC-880H.** Please visit the ICOM website for more information: <http://www.icomamerica.com/en/products/amateur/dstar/dstar/default.aspx>

Don't forget the DV Dongle (http://dvdongle.com/DV_Dongle/Home.html). It's very cost effective and allows the ham radio operator to use his computer to connect to the D-STAR gateway – it also serves as a useful diagnostic tool when used in conjunction with a D-STAR radio. It connects to your PC, Mac or Linux via a USB port and provides encoding and decoding of digital audio. The DVTool application used with the DV Dongle may be installed and run on Microsoft Windows XP/Vista, Mac OS X Leopard, or many flavors of Linux.

There is much interest in a new method of accessing D-STAR through the local repeater. It's called **HotSpot**. It's similar to adding a remote receiver site to an existing analog repeater. W1IX, Justin lives right here in Columbus and has a HotSpot site on the air! You can also find him on the W8RXX/R's on 444.200 and 146.76. He's very helpful and I'm sure he would be happy to talk to you about it as well as answer any D-STAR questions you might have.

I am in the process of rearranging my ham shack so I am not able to get on D-STAR from my home QTH; however, I do get on D-STAR when I'm in my mobile.

Upcoming Amateur Radio VE Testing News

Bill wants to remind many older “Technician Class” Amateurs that they can still do a paper upgrade to “General Class” simply by showing up at a testing session and providing proper documentation. Below is a common question that is asked.

Q. My Technician license was issued prior to March 21, 1987, am I grandfathered?

A. Actually, having held a Tech before March 21, 1987, you could have already taken proof of holding that license to a volunteer examiner (VE) test session and already enjoying General privileges. Proof of holding that license prior to March 21, 1987, could be a copy of the Technician license grant or the page listing from the Radio Amateur Call Book showing your call sign / license listing as Technician. At the November CORC pot luck there will be a VE team there to do your Technician to General grandfathered upgrade for FREE! Be certain to bring the proper proof as mentioned above.

For the following dates the exam & test are FREE!

10/31 Saturday (Halloween) 10:30 AM Universal Amateur Radio - Test only

11/12 Thursday 7:00 PM - Genoa Township Hall – Test Only

11/27 (Black Friday) 9 AM TENTATIVE Tech Cram session, test at 1:30 PM at Universal Radio.
